Litigation

NIMJ has filed an amicus motion and brief in <u>United States v. Rudometkin</u>, ARMY 20180058, 2021 CCA LEXIS 596 (A. Ct. Crim. App. Nov. 9, 2021) (memorandum op.), a case certified to the Court of Appeals for the Armed Forces.

Vaccines:

April 5, 2022, **NIMJ** filed an amicus brief on behalf of the Defendants / Appellants in <u>U.S. Navy SEALS</u>, <u>et. al. v. Joseph R. Biden</u>, <u>Jr., et. al</u>. All parties consented to our filing. NIMJ **thanks** A. Richard Ellis, an attorney in Mill Valley, CA, for his help in getting this amicus and others filed as local counsel.

<u>Living with HIV and in the military or want to be:</u>

Here are links to <u>Harrison v.Austin</u> (an applicant for the DCANG JAG Corps) and <u>Roe v. Austin</u>. Judge Brinkema, EDVA, has issued rulings in cases arguing against the current DoD policy of enlistment and assignments and retention of those living with HIV.

Unanimous court-martial verdicts:

ACCA heard an oral argument in *Dial* on April 14, 2022. Case <u>documents here</u>). Amicus <u>brief by NACDL</u> here.

<u>United States v. Martinez</u>, No. ACM 39973 2022 CCA LEXIS 212 (A. F. Ct. Crim. App. April 6, 2022) (memorandum op.). A unanimous "jury" case, with NIMJ Fellow Prof. Steve Vladeck as counsel.

<u>United States v. Scott</u>, Petition at the CAAF denied March 3, 2022. In <u>United States v. Dial</u> and <u>United States v. Ferriera</u>, writs are still pending at ACCA, with the trial proceedings stayed. In <u>United States v. Westcott</u>, No. ACM 39936, 2022 CCA LEXIS 156 (A. F. Ct. Crim. App. Mar. 17, 2022) (memorandum op.), at least one judge of the court would hold that the Appellant was denied the right to a unanimous "jury" finding of guilt. Slip op. at *108.
