<u>Annual Report of the Office of the Judge Advocate General</u> (UK), 2021-2022. HHJ Large observes "Anyone with an interest in the Service Justice System will have noted reports in the media and elsewhere about conviction rates in sexual cases in the Court Martial." A footnote takes you to the Ministry of Defence (UK), <u>Murder</u>, <u>manslaughter</u>, <u>and sexual offences in the Service Justice System</u>. December 2022.

In 2021, there were 239 investigations into allegations of a sexual offence.

In 2021, there were 124 referrals to the Prosecuting Authority.

In 2021, 145 cases went to trial (an increase of 37 more than in 2020).

In 2021, 37 accused's were found guilty of one or more sex offences.
